1. Call To Order

Mayor Savikataaq Jr. called the meeting to order at 6:00PM

2. Opening Prayer

- Led by Councillor Mrs. Hannak

3. Review and Approval of Agenda

Be it resolved that the Hamlet Council approves to amend the agenda to include the CPHO as delegates and to add land applications and to approve the agenda for Tuesday, July 14, 2026, regular council meeting.

4. Delegates

- RCMP June 2026 Monthly Report -Cst. Smith
 - Cst. Smith asked if any members of the council have any questions.
- Mayor, Savikataaq Jr.
 - Says there have been concerns from community members regarding late night ATV parades happening. Asked what can be done to stop this from happening as there have been many emails and phone calls regarding late night ATV parades.
- Cst. Smith
 - Says they have received a couple calls as well and says he has seen the ATV parades happening. Says that under the criminal code of Canada, there is no enforcement under the criminal code related to ATV parades. Says under the territorial acts, there is the basic driver's safety act with stopping at stop signs, wearing helmets etc. Says if they start enforcing the use of helmets, they will have to do it all the time for everyone including elders, adults and children meaning they would need to stop and ticket every person who is not wearing a helmet. Says whether if it is the community wants but believes it isn't the case. Says he looked at a by-law that was not passed which is the "Curfew & Disturbance of the Peace By-Law".

- Mayor, Savikataaq Jr.
 - Says they received legal opinion regarding the Curfew & Disturbance of the peace by-law and were informed that it is illegal to set a curfew unless there has been a state of emergency in which it could only last 2 weeks.
- Cst. Smith
 - Says the other option would be to create a by-law that prohibits ATV parades from happening otherwise they would need to enforce the use of helmets and other violations under the off-road vehicles act.
- Mayor, Savikataaq Jr.
 - Says he would rather not see that as there are many families who are unable to afford to purchase helmets and many ATV's are the main source of transportation and would not want to make things harder for those who depend on ATV's for transportation, hunting and gathering purposes. Says no laws are being broken when the ATV's are parading. Says the main annoyance is the ones who are accelerating their engines and driving recklessly.
- Cst. Smith
 - Says from what he has seen and in videos, nobody is recklessly driving during the ATV parades and that it is an orderly parade. Says he would rather see that than small groups of 3 ripping around town. Says they are also aware of those with loud mufflers and that they are trying to crack down on those who are causing an annoyance with the loud mufflers particularly the dirt bikes.
 - Says in the past couple months they have been very successful dealing with liquor offenses with tickets being issued.
- Councillor, Main
 - Raised questions on whether if the RCMP have enough manpower to deal with ATV related offences and if they require assistance from the Hamlet. He also asked how many RCMP members are currently staffed.
- Cst. Smith
 - Says with the many liquor seizures that happened, they have had time to deal with the smaller incidents/offenses. Says there are currently 4 RCMP members staffed.

- Mayor Savikataaq Jr.
 - Says he believes if there is an administrative assistant to conduct criminal record checks at the detachment, the RCMP will have more time to be on patrol.

- Cst. Smith
 - Says he agrees with the mayor about the administration assistant and that there are still work in progress in hiring an RCMP detachment administrator to process criminal record checks.

- Mayor Savikataaq Jr.
 - Mr. Savikataaq Jr. thanked the RCMP for their efforts and for taking the time to host a BBQ for the community on Nunavut Day and for responding to mental health related calls.

- Cst. Smith
 - Mr. Smith reported an increase in mental health-related calls over a two-week period but noted that the number has since decreased somewhat. He advised that if there are any concerns within the community, or if anyone suspects someone is experiencing a mental health crisis, they should contact the RCMP and that they don't have an issue in dealing with mental health crisis if it means someone staying alive.

- Councillor, Mrs. Gibbons
 - Asked if the RCMP get assistance from the mental health nurses when dealing with mental health incidents and other incidents.

- Cst. Smith
 - He stated that community members were already at the scene assisting the two individuals who had become stuck in the mud and commended the community for responding so quickly.
 - He explained that when responding to mental health-related calls, there is an established protocol in place. The mental health department is notified, and the individual is transported to the health centre, where they can be assessed and supported in a controlled environment. He added that RCMP members follow established procedures to ensure their own safety before engaging with an individual who may be experiencing a mental health crisis. He also stated that the ambulance and fire department are usually on standby assisting.

- Waste water and Environmental monitoring in Arviat-
 - Robert Delatolla, PhD, PEng, Professor, University of Ottawa, CIHR Applied Public Health Chair in Environment, Climate change and One Health
 - Ekua Agyemang, MBCHB, MPH, FRCPC, Chief Public Health Officer, Government of Nunavut, Faculty of Medicine & Dentistry, University of Alberta.
 - Jackie Dawson, PhD, Professor, University of Ottawa, Canada Research Chair in the Human and Policy Dimensions of Climate Change

- CPHO -Dr. Ekua
 - Introduced zoom meeting members and gave an introduction of the proposed wastewater and environmental monitoring study in Arviat.
 - Their mission is to advance wastewater testing as a surveillance tool to help address substance use issues in Nunavut. They aim to use this approach to identify the substances present in communities and gain a better understanding of substance use patterns to inform public health efforts.

- Mr. Delatolla
 - Says the team brought together for the wastewater and environmental monitoring study aims to work collaboratively with the community. This approach invites community partnership in developing an early warning system through wastewater and environmental monitoring, with the goal of supporting and protecting the community's health and wellbeing.
 - Says the goal of wastewater and environmental monitoring is to identify pathogens, diseases, and other substances that provide insight into community health. In the past, the laboratory could detect only two pathogens associated with diseases such as polio and COVID-19. Today, it can detect approximately 30 different health-related pathogens, diseases, and other substances, including toxic compounds. This expanded testing also provides a better understanding of drug use trends within the communities.
 - Explained the process of collecting wastewater for testing, noting that the results help identify which pathogens are circulating within the community. Explained that the testing detects molecular markers associated with various pathogens while maintaining anonymity, meaning individual identities cannot be determined. The data provides insight into the presence of pathogens and other substances that may be circulating in the community. Says all the information gathered is at a community level. Says this testing will allow for the detection of any pathogens, diseases and possible substances that are not easily tested and readily available at a community level. Says they would like to build a lasting capacity in the community where they would like to bring the testing equipment into the community. They hope to build training opportunities together and to involve youth in the project.

- Mayor, Mr. Savikataaq Jr.
 - Says he noticed Covid can be detected, asked when samples are taken from the sewage trucks, majority of the wastewater is a mix of laundry, showers, from doing dishes, why was it required to do testing done up the nostrils making it difficult.

- CPHO, Dr. Ekua
 - Says the testing done on the nostrils was to predict the next wave of covid transmissions but this type of waste water testing is a broader type of testing where they are able to detect and trace any diseases, pathogens and toxic substances and to see the levels of illnesses such as RSV that may be in the communities as well as with the opioid crisis happening, it will be easier to detect and find out what types of drugs are roaming in the communities as an early warning system to avoid any overdoses from happening.

- Mayor Mr. Savikataaq Jr.
 - He said this is an excellent initiative, as wastewater and environmental testing can help identify the presence of opioids and other substances circulating within the community. Since it is challenging for the RCMP to determine what substances are present through traditional means alone, the results of this testing could provide valuable insight into what drugs are entering and circulating in the community. This information would help the RCMP better understand local trends and support more informed responses to the presence of harmful substances. Mr. Savikataaq Jr. asked if Dr. Ekua and her team need any support from the mayor and council.

- Councillor, Mr. Main
 - He expressed support for passing a motion to endorse the proposed wastewater and environmental monitoring initiative in the community. He noted that Nunavut has experienced issues with harmful substances and said it would be beneficial to take a proactive approach to help ensure Arviat remains safe. He also suggested that the team reach out to the local health centre to offer support and discuss what they would like to monitor through the program, including tuberculosis (TB) and other communicable illnesses and diseases.

- Deputy Mayor, Mr. Kidlapik
 - Asked whether the wastewater monitoring testing will involve the traditional foods that are eaten in Arviat such as land and sea mammals. Asked if there will be testing done to detect if any pathogens or chemicals that may be present when consuming traditional food.

- Mr. Delatolla
 - Says in some communities where they do test, they do test animals that are harvested and if this is what the community would like to see, it is possible to do testing.
 - Says it is possible to work with the environmental department to collect samples from local catches and do testing on them.

- Dr. Ekua
 - Says another possibility is to do testing on water bodies outside of the community. Says if this is what something that the community wants to see, it is possible to do so.

7. Operational Matters and Reports

- SAO Report -Mr. Hussey
 - June 9, 2026 -Attended regular council meeting
 - June 15-19, 2026, participated in the collective bargaining process negotiate a new agreement with the unionized employees.
 - June 18, 2026, Attended special council meeting to update council on the collective bargaining and get approval to adjust the offer made to the union. Also, attended the presentation from the Government of Nunavut representatives on the update of the solid waste facility upgrades for Arviat.

8. Mayor's Comments, Councillor Members Topics & Concerns

- Deputy Mayor, Mr. Kidlapik
 - He expressed concerns about children coming too close to moving vehicles, particularly heavy equipment, including while riding bicycles. He noted that he received a call from a community member who witnessed a child on a bicycle get too close to a moving vehicle. The child made contact with the vehicle's wheel, resulting in a minor accident. He suggested issuing a reminder to parents, asking them to speak with their children about staying a safe distance away from moving vehicles, especially heavy equipment.
- Councillor, Mr. Caskey
 - Requested an update on the construction and repair work at the community hall, noting that the project was expected to begin in June. Asked whether the tender had already been issued and requested the anticipated timeline for the construction work and repairs to the community hall floor.
- ASAO, Mrs. Tattuinee
 - Says the tender went out and there were issues with the tender in which it had to be cancelled and reissued.
 - Discussion with mayor and council on the status of the construction and repairs at the community hall.

- Councillor, Mr. Caskey
 - Raised concerns about the lengthy wait times for medevac patients. Suggested requesting a larger aircraft to help reduce delays and increase capacity, allowing the aircraft to transport additional patients from across the Kivalliq region who require hospitalization.
 - Raised concerns regarding having a full-time doctor in Arviat as there is currently no full-time doctor in the community. Says with the large population, there should be a full-time doctor.
 - Says his thanks to the water/sewage truck drivers for navigating the roads in a safe manner as there are many kids on the road during the summertime.

- Councillor, Mrs. Hannak
 - Raised concerns about the well-being of newly hired, younger by-law officers. Recommended providing access to counselling and other support services for officers who experience traumatic incidents, noting that the nature of their work may expose them to distressing situations.
 - Raised concerns regarding the road leading to the mikilaa lake noting that there is a large drop off on the right side of the road. Suggested to install a fence to avoid any accidents from happening.
 - Asked if rig mats were installed where boaters launch their boats and if there are any plans to fix the boat launching areas.
 - Asked if there are any plans to upgrade, repair or the creation of a blueprint at the graveyards as there are some crosses that are missing and/or broken. Suggested to have the summer students work on the graveyards and creating a blueprint of the graveyards.

- Councillor, Mr. Main
 - Noted that the Hamlet of Arviat is covered under the Nunavut Employees Benefits program, which allows employees to access counselling services. Also noted that additional supports for post-traumatic stress-related incidents are available through Government of Nunavut resources.

- Mayor Mr. Savikataaq Jr.,
 - Says the rig mats were installed but they floated away during the high tide.

- SAO, Mr. Hussey
 - Says he will request for an update about the graveyards from the Forman.

- Councillor, Mrs. Aulatjut
 - Says there are resources available for Hamlet employees who wish to receive counselling through online counseling or through the phone as some do not wish to go through the health centre to receive counselling. Requested that there be resources available for all employees needing counselling especially the younger employees.
 - Says she is impressed with the recreation department for their hard work during the games that were held in welcoming the Premier of Manitoba and during the Nunavut Day celebrations.
 - She also thanked the community clean up crew for their hard work in keeping the community clean.

- Councillor, Mr. Main
 - Says there were a lot of garbage at the sports park but noticed that it had been cleaned. Says the garbage bins were filled up and suggested to remind the garbage truck crew to empty the garbage bins at the playground when they are not as busy with other tasks.
 - Says there are many people who are looking for houses to rent in Arviat and asked how the amortization for the two 5 plexes is doing. Says with many major capital projects happening in Arviat, suggested the Hamlet of Arviat look into building more units for investing.

- Mayor, Mr. Savikataaq Jr.
 - Agrees with Mr. Main that the sports park needs some attention. Mentioned that some of the gabion baskets will also need to be repaired.
 - Says some of the prices for construction of housing units are very steep right now with some prices for a 3-bedroom house costing \$1.5 million.

- Councillor, Mrs. Gibbons
 - Requested an update on the Dene overlap as she says they were going to provide an update in June.

- Mayor, Savikataaq Jr.
 - Says there has been no update regarding the Dene overlap.

- Councillor, Mr. Curley
 - Says the old nurse's residents is being demolished. Says it is taking a while and asked what the plans are for the demolition.
 - Says there are many abandoned cabins and trash just outside of the town. Suggested to encourage cabin owners to clean around their cabins.
 - Says he noticed some of the gabion baskets around the sports park need repairs. Suggested to have them repaired for the safety of the kids.

- Mayor Mr. Savikataaq Jr.
 - Says the demolition is taking a while because they are doing it manually and says the person in charge of the demolition is providing scrap material for those who wish to take some. Says the person in charge of the demolition has also hired local people to help with the demolition.
 - Says the NHC has no plans to build on the location this year as the materials still have not come in through the sea lift.
 - Agreed with Councillor Mr. Curley that there are many areas on the outskirts of town, especially old dog team areas that require a clean up.
 - Suggested that another topic for discussion could be using some of the funds from the Arviat Fund to clean up areas around town, particularly locations with old, abandoned ATVs and other debris.
